TROUTDALE'S OPPORTUNITY.

If the people of Troutdale adopt their proposed new charter next month they should be congratulated upon their ability to determine what is best for their city. From a careful perusal of the various sections of the document it is easy to assert that it will be an improvement over the vague and incomplete charter that is now the law of the incorporation.

The people of any city have the right to better their condition, and that is what many of the voters of Troutdale are attempting to do. The present charter, granted by the county court, is sadly lacking in many provisions. It gives authority to levy taxes and collect licenses but none to spend the money so collected for anything in the way of improvements. There is no warrant for improving the streets or even building a city hall. Bonding the city for necessary utilities could not be thought of; nor could any advancement be made in building up the place so as to make it attractive to homeseekers or investors. All these things are to be changed if the new charter is adopted.

Troutdale has many natural advantages, situated as it is on one of the great overland railways with the richest agricultural land in the state surrounding it. It has had a few serious set-backs during the past few years in the loss of some of its most successful industries, and the town must have a change from the old way of depending on others to depending upon itself. This change can only come about by taking on a renewed existence in other directions. The place must be brought under the spirit of progressiveness, and that is what the thinking men and women of Troutdale are trying to accomplish. They are adopting the new method of attracting the outside world by making it possible to do business away from home—something they could not do before because of their inability to rise above their environments.

The new charter is only the beginning. Following it will come enterprise and expansion; the city will step out of the rut upon the broader highway to prosperity, and then Troutdale will begin to grow.

The proposed bonded indebtedness will be only \$5000; but that will be enough, with the other sums coming in from other sources, to give the city a start that will give its municipal officers and improvement clubs all they will want to do for awhile, to show that they are capable of managing the town's affairs to the satisfaction of the people most interested—and to show the country that Troutdale is progressive and progressing.
