Cream for Butter Making.

"A fairly rich cream gives best results for butter making," says O. G. Simpson of the Oregon Agricultural College dairy school. "A cream that will test 30 to 35 per cent or produce about three and a half pounds of butter to ten pounds of cream is good. Other conditions being equal, a rich cream will keep longer and churn more easily than a thin cream. If the cream is to be kept any length of time before ripening, it should be cooled immediately after skimming to below 60 degrees. Tin containers are preferable to crocks or other material. Tin allows the temperature to be changed more easily, and is easier to handle and keep clean. If two lots of cream are to be mixed, they should both assume the same temperature before mixing."
