Lewis Neilson has returned home from Portland for a few days.

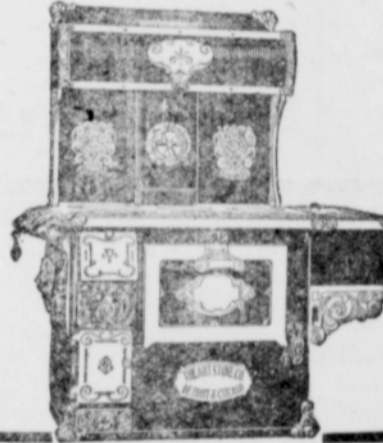

The road will be built up the coast to Myrtle Point, in Coos county, and will then proceed up the valley of the Rogue river, connecting with the Southern Pacific main line at Grants Pass. It is stated that work will begin this present summer.
