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PREMIUMS OFFERED FOR JUVENILE FAIR AT ORIENT

As the date for this year's county fair, approaches the interest that is being taken in it is spreading to the various localities where community centers exist, and there is growing up a spirit to make exhibits at home for which prizes are to be awarded.

It is noticeable that the greater number of these exhibits are to be made in the grange contest, the idea being to encourage the young people to make the entries. These exhibits will be brought to Gresham and entered here in grange competition for the liberal prizes that are

to be won this year. Probably none of them will make a complete exhibit here, but they will supplement the farm products and help to make the exhibits good representations of their communities.

Such a fair is to be held at Orient just a few days before the Gresham fair opens. It is to be a juvenile contest throughout and will be held in Multnomah grange hall.
