The National Citizens' League for the Promotion of a Sound Banking System, with headquarters at 223 West Jackson boulevard, Chicago, announces that it has a membership of more than 10,000 business men, bankers, farmers and union men, who are pledged to the cause of banking reform. Membership in the league costs a dollar, and each member is entitled to all the league's educational literature, including a monthly periodical and a 450-page book, substantially bound, dealing with the problem in an untechnical way. This book was edited by J. Laurence Laughlin, professor of political economy in the University of Chicago.
