ARTIFICIAL WONDER IS LAKE LUCERNE

An artificial wonder has been created at Bull Run in the big reservoir that is easily the largest of its kind in the northwest. It covers somewhere near 200 acres and is used as the head of the big power plant located on the river bank half a mile below.

The romantic name of Lake Lucerne has been given the sheet of water, a name taken from one of the scenic lakes of Switzerland. The place will be made a summer resort with a hotel on the bluff overlooking the Bull Run. A number of chateaus will be built along the edge of the lake and other attractive features provided. As the reservoir is about 400 feet above the railway a tramway will be built for easy ascent. It will probably be operated by cable owing to the steep grade and necessary turns to be made in making the ascent.

The work will be commenced early next year so as to have the place in readiness for next summer.
