TO THE MEMORY OF MRS. MARY E. WIKOFF

The funeral of Mrs. Wesley Wikoff occurred Sunday afternoon at the Methodist Episcopal church. Rev. Melville T. Wire preaching the sermon. Among those present at the funeral were the son Carl, who arrived Saturday noon from Denver, Colo., F. M. Mewhirter of Portland, and W. B. Mewhirter, of Gervais, and Mrs. J. E. Chittenden, of Portland, brothers and sister of the deceased and Mrs. Jacques, a niece, of Portland. The interment was in Gresham cemetery.

Mary Emmaline Wikoff was born at Griswold, Iowa, December 13, 1861, and died at Gresham, Oregon, July 30, 1913, at 10 a. m. Her maiden name was Mewhirter. She was married to Wesley Wikoff, January 18, 1883, after their marriage they continued to reside in the neighborhood of Griswold for several years. Later moving to Nebraska and then to Oklahoma and then to Denver where they lived eight years, coming to Oregon in April of this year, residing for the most part in Portland, until her sad death. For a year she had been in ill health. At all times patient and hopeful. Three weeks ago she was removed to her brother's home in Gresham. It soon became apparent to loved ones who watched over her that the end was near. She approached it, for the most part in merciful unconsciousness and passed away quietly and painlessly.

She leaves a husband Wesley Wikoff and two living children, Carl Wikoff and Freda Wikoff, beside five sisters and three brothers, among which her death is the first. They are Mrs. G.
