J. B. Sutherland, who lately bought the old Horton property at Edgewood, has remodeled the house and is making several other improvements that will make the place very attractive and one of the neatest homes on the Base Line.

Sunday's baseball game at St. Johns was a victory for the home team over the Gresham Kids by a score of 10 to 5. Several of the best players from here were substituted by inexperienced boys, but the game was a good one in spite of the handicap.

The family of L. R. Schmorel, camping in a tent at Ruby, was burned out on Sunday afternoon. Fire from a pile of burning logs on the lots that are being cleared, set the tent ablaze and everything in it was destroyed in a few minutes. The damage was several hundred dollars.

Harry M. Leslie and family of Robinson, Kansas, are touring the Pacific coast and are staying with the family of W. T. Shepard at Fairview for a few days. Mr. Leslie will engage in the newspaper business on Puget Sound upon his return from a trip to southern California about a month from now.

Recent sales of real estate in this section make it appear that the business is looking up. Three sales last week were reported by one Portland firm. W. D. Deaver bought a 20-acre tract near here for \$5000. It is partly improved. J. E. Johnson purchased 10 acres of the P. H. Rook farm near Orient, paying \$2000. E. A. Moore was the buyer of a 10-acre tract in Troutdale park for \$3000. These prices are considered very low.

The Portland Floral society passed through Gresham on Sunday over 100 strong, for the Gladiolus farm of W. L. Crissey, at Bull Run. More than 40 varieties of the beautiful plant are in full bloom on the two acre farm. The blooms range in color from pure white to a deep crimson, and there are more than 200,000 plants in bloom at this time. Among the fine varieties grown by Crissey are the "Europe," the first pure white gladiolus grown; the "Princes," "Niagara," "Harlequin" and "Klondyke."

THREE BAGS OF GOLD

The Torsely-Told Tale of What a "White Elephant" Could Do in 55 Years.

MINERS MYSTERIOUSLY VANISHED

Washington, D. C.—Three bags of gold, worth about \$600.00, have been in Uncle Sam's possession more than 50 years although they do not belong to him. They are known as the "three white elephants" because they are a continual source of perplexity to the federal accounting officers.

In 1856 H. J. Peters brought \$127.87 worth of gold bullion to the San Francisco mint. In 1858 Joseph Baker presented \$330.27 and in 1863 J. M. Souther handed over \$156.96. Each of the men took a receipt for the treasure he had laboriously "panned out" in the gold fields. Not one of them ever returned.
