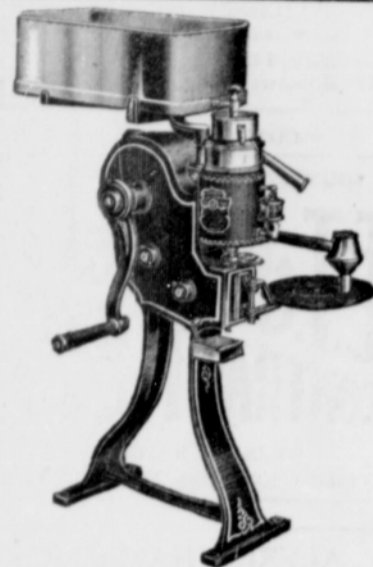

PORTLAND NEWS ITEMS IN PARAGRAPHS

The accepted name for the Portland, Eugene and Eastern is "Willamette valley line." When you hear about the W. V. L. road you'll know that it is the electric line running up the Willamette river.

Charged with being a masher, the Rev. Henry Kuhlman, aged 39 years, said to reside at Tillamook, was lodged in the city jail early this morning. Detectives Price and Patrolman McCarthy alleging that he accosted two women after 1 o'clock this morning.

Sheriff Word has employed the law firm of Dolph, Mallory, Simon & Gearin to represent him in the suit brought by Rudolph Schwab, I. W. W. agitator, to collect \$20,000 for being imprisoned in the county jail and for the breaking up of his meetings by the sheriff.

Although given orders to arrest all wearers of X-ray garments, the Portland police have been unable to find one anywhere. Probably they are not looking for them on the ground but in the air. The women are threatening a crusade on men's trousers which many consider as immoral as sheath skirts.

"It will not be necessary for voters to re-register in order to participate in the interstate bridge bond election on November 4 or the special state referendum election on the same date," said Henry Bush, chief clerk in County Clerk Coffey's office yesterday. "It will, however, be necessary for all voters to register again before the next regular election, as the old registration is dead except for special elections."

The new registration will be permanent. County Clerk Coffey is seeking, however, to discourage registration at the present time for the reason that the great influx of women voters will make it necessary for the county to be redistricted this fall. Mr. Bush says this probably will not be done before November and that where there are now 192 precincts there probably will be about 400.

The law contemplates that there shall not be more than 300 voters in any one precinct.

Dr. Lytle, state veterinarian, asked for the appointment of Dr. S. L. Brown as county veterinarian, saying rabies have spread from Multnomah county to Clackamas county and threaten to spread throughout the Willamette valley. Dr. Brown, he said, has taken treatment rendering him supposedly impervious to the disease. The application was refused by the county court.

Nine immigration agents of the Northern Pacific Railroad company will be in town Saturday morning. They are coming here to get acquainted with the territory. They will be met at Hayden Island by a committee from the Commercial club in an observation car and taken to the Forestry building, to Council Crest and other points of interest in the city. At noon they will be entertained at a luncheon at the Commercial club, where they will meet the members of the Oregon State Immigration Commission. The party started from St. Paul August 11, and is looking after the immigration interests of the railroad company along the line.

NEW C. O. D. PARCEL POST REGULATIONS

The sender of a mailable parcel on which the postage is fully prepaid may have the price of the article and the charges thereon collected from the addressee on payment of a fee of ten cents affixed, provided the amount to be collected does not exceed \$100. Such a parcel will be insured against loss, without additional charges, in an amount equivalent to its actual value, but not to exceed \$50. The sender of a collect on delivery (C. O. D.) parcel will be given a receipt showing the office and date of mailing the number of the parcel and the amount due him.

A C. O. D. parcel will be accepted for mailing only at a money order office and when addressed to a money order office. The above order went into effect July 1, 1913.
