Should the cannery be moved here it would add another important enterprise to this place and solve the fruit canning problem for this vicinity at the same time.

L. & P., the Beaver Motor company, and the Umbdenstock & Larson real estate company. Gresham needs them all and as they are becoming interested in us as the citizens of Gresham should extend to them every cordial assurance of welcome and good will.

The various committees who have the "smoker" in charge are hard at work to make the affair a success, and are using every endeavor to arrange for such a welcome to our distinguished guests that they may carry away with them even better impressions than they now have and decide them to make further investments in the various lines they represent.

AUTO HONKS.

Several 1914 models have been received in Portland and orders for shipments are being made.

The Reo Car Co. is now capitalized at \$2,000,000 and is said to be paying 30 per cent on this capitalization.

The Cadillac company was launched in 1901 with \$300,000 capital and the Packard in 1903 with \$500,000.

The present working population of Detroit's automobile industry is in excess of the entire population of the state of Nevada.

The Peerless Motor Car Co., manufacturers of the high priced Peerless car, paid 20 per cent last year. Its capital stock is \$10,000,000.

The Packard Motor Co., known as "the rich man's toy" paid 14 per cent on its \$10,000,000 capital stock last year. The high priced cars are still selling.

C. M. Zimmerman of Gresham has a licensed chauffeur ready for any emergency. Ask for the Overland service car and O. E. Milleson when you want to get there.

The new 1914 Ford runabout will sell next year at retail for \$450. They are two-passenger cars. The four-passenger cars will probably sell for \$575 or thereabouts.

The Franklin Manufacturing Co., makers of the Franklin car, increased its stock January 3, 1913, from \$300,000 to \$1,500,000, declaring a 200 per cent stock dividend.

It is said that Mike Allhouse has developed into such a good salesman that he can persuade a man to buy a car just by giving him a smell of the brand of gasoline he uses.

The Hudson people last week declared a dividend of \$1,000,000 which is 100 per cent. More than \$250,000 was also carried to the surplus account. The Hudson is selling for \$2250 and the shipments are 30 a day.

The Chalmers Motor company commenced business in 1909, as did also the DeLuxe, afterwards the E. M. F., and later absorbed at an enormous price, by the Studebaker corporation and now known as the "Studebaker."

The General Motor Co. (the automobile trust) is said to have paid \$5,000,000 for the \$1,500,000 stock of The Cadillac Motor Car Co. The Cadillac and the Buick (another great money maker) are the best known of the cars controlled by the General Motor Co.

It is said that the Ford company started with a capital of \$5,000, and that only \$28,000 was ever paid into the company. They have just declared a dividend of \$10,000,000 for part of 1913, their tenth season. They now occupy 65 acres and are the largest plant in the world.

Any one of these companies today is doing an annual business larger in volume than the entire city's industry was in 1905. It is estimated that the value of cars made in Detroit alone in 1913 will amount to \$462,180,000, while the total assessed city valuation is only \$456,816,100.

The Hudson Motor Car company which it is announced has just declared a dividend of \$1,000,000, increased its stock in November, 1910, from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000 by a 900 per cent stock dividend. They have no bonded indebtedness and their business for the year ending July 1, was \$10,500,000.

Chalmers Motor Co., in four years has grown from a capitalization of \$300,000, to \$6,500,000. The original stockholders have received in dividends about 1500 per cent on their investment. The plant has grown from one to seventeen buildings and now covers over thirty acres. They have never ceased laying bricks on new buildings.

The Hupp Motor company it is stated, started a few years ago with \$7,500. Its capital stock is now \$1,000,000, having been increased from \$500,000 during the past year. There have been three increases of \$250,000 each in the past two years, made entirely from the surplus on hand and each time leaving a comfortable margin in the treasury. They expect to make 15,000 cars this next season.

The Automobile industry dates back to about 1899 when commercial cars were first made, through Henry Ford and R. E. Olds who developed a horseless carriage which would actually run before that date. The first factory was the Olds Motor Works, capital \$500,000, which began to make cars in September, 1899, in Detroit, Mich.

Henry Ford continued his invention experiments in "the old barn" and later, June, 1913, built a small plant in the suburbs of Detroit from which has developed in 10 years the \$200,000,000 enterprises of today.
