**The Library as a Supplement to the Schools.**

Supplementing the schools of the surrounding country, standing ready and eager to be of any assistance to each and all grades is the Gresham library. The first few grades can only be reached through the primary books, and the story hour. It is the aim of the library to cultivate in the children even at this early age a love for better literature. The stories and books are selected with this idea in view.

In the fifth and sixth grades the children are then beginning to use the library for current events and other data. A young folks' encyclopedia has been furnished in addition to the books on special subjects, also the World's Chronicle for the current events supplemented by a weekly bulletin giving prominence to the most important events with instructions as to where to find them.

In the eighth grade the pupil is given access to the reference collection so as to assist him on the road of knowledge leading to the higher realms. Not only has the Gresham boy or girl this privilege, but each and every boy and girl in the surrounding country of Multnomah or a joint school.

The library is willing and anxious to give any assistance possible over the phone as well as in the building itself. The teachers of outlying schools are urged to make all possible use of the library, if not over the phone through the mail.

The high school pupils and teachers will always find co-operation given gladly and freely and all material not secured in the Gresham library can be from the main. Few outside of Multnomah county have access to the large collection such as is in Portland. The privilege of drawing on the main library is one we should not pass over too lightly, or fail to appreciate. The number of volumes in the Gresham library

exceeds that of many small libraries, being due to the library system of Multnomah county. It is hoped that in the near future that all the surrounding county will turn to the Gresham library for any and all material they should be in need of.

equipped throughout with Waterman-Waterbury heating and ventilating plants. A piano is being placed in the school which will no doubt aid in the development of musical talent.

A microscope is being added to the laboratory to be used in connection with the study of agriculture and botany.

Last year, through the efforts of the teachers and board of directors, a Patron-Teachers' association was organized with a result, according to the testimony of several of the older patrons, that the patrons and teachers have never before been brought in so close a relationship during the history of the school. The management of the school has also felt the benefit derived from these meetings and as a result they will be continued and encouraged during the coming year.

It is the aim of the association to have persons of ability and experience in educational work to be present at each of these meetings to address the members upon different subjects.

A word of credit might here be said for the board of directors, who spare neither time nor energy in making their school one of the best in the state. They have visited the school in a body every four weeks, and individually oftener, thereby keeping themselves in touch with the conditions of the school at all times.

School opens September 22d and with the existing advantages and improvements should be the beginning of one of the best years the school has ever enjoyed. If the teachers, pupils, patrons and school board will put their shoulders to the wheel and all push together the success of the pupils need not be doubted.
