BETTER SYSTEM REQUIRED.

The unfortunate squabble over the committee awards to some of the granges which had exhibits at the county fair has set more than one person to thinking that there is something wrong with the system of judging. The great difference between the ratings of the three judges was shown in the score cards published. No two persons can ever judge alike, no matter how honest they are, and there is where the system is at fault.

Some judges are misled by the quantity of exhibits shown, and will give a high rating to an inferior lot of goods. This assertion may be illustrated by saying that more than 150 varieties of grain might be shown, of which many would have very little commercial value. Yet it is almost a sure thing that a careless or ignorant judge would rank such a display higher than he would thirty varieties that are the standards of commerce.

It is a mistake, too, to expect one person to judge several different divisions, such as were represented in the grange booths. For such displays, where points are based on five different subjects, there should have been five judges. A competent farmer could decide in a few minutes which booth held the best in agriculture; a horticulturist should pass judgment on the fruit; a competent judge of domestic science should be the sole arbiter in that line; a man who knows all about grains and grasses would have the best judge of that part; and in neatness and arrangement the decision should have been left to a competent decorator from the city. Each one of such judges should have attended only to his own line and not to the whole of them, as was done.

The solution of the problem by the board of directors is, in our estimation, the best that could be made. Next year there will be a different system of judging and more time will be taken before announcing the final results. Each grange should make an effort to win highest honors and we believe every one of them will try it again.

A movement has been started by the Albany Commercial club to get all the clubs of western Oregon together at the State Fair for the purpose of boosting the Willamette Valley as a whole and not leave this important work to the separate communities. Efforts will also be made to unite the counties of Lane, Linn, Marion, Polk, Benton and Yamhill in the preparation and installation of one big exhibit at the exposition in San Francisco. The date for the joint club meeting has been set for October 2.

An even dozen localities are represented in the Outlook correspondence in this issue. It is all well worthy of perusal, but especial attention is called to the correspondence from Columbia Heights relating to the opening of the public schools. These little letters from these thriving communities are of importance to the people in those neighborhoods, and we are grateful to be the medium of exchange between them.
