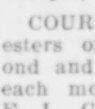

Origin of Irish Lace.

Mary Must Not Marry Mark.

A curious idea among the Burnese is that people born on the same day of the week must not marry and that if they defy the fates their union will be marked by much ill luck. To prevent these disastrous marriages every girl carries a record of her birthday in her name, each day of the week having a letter belonging to it, and all children are called by a name that begins with that letter. It is rather hard if the Marys and Marks of Burma fall in love with each other, as in this country. Unlike other oriental lands, the young people are allowed to marry as taste dictates, subject only to the birthday restrictions.

Constituents of Dust.

Among the constituents of dust floating in the air are lead, silver, copper, rubidium, gallium, indium, thallium, nickel, manganese, etc. Many of these can be traced to their sources in factory chimneys and flues. Dust from clouds, collected either by itself or in hail, snow, sleet or rain exhibits a regularity of composition not seen in other varieties of dust. Iron, nickel, calcium, copper, potassium and sodium always appear in it in about the same proportions. Some dust that fell some years ago near Dublin resembled meteorites in its composition, was attracted by a magnet and seemed to be of cosmic origin.

Barbers in Egypt.

In Egypt a large proportion of the barbers are state functionaries. According to an edict issued by Ibrahim Pasha in 1848, every village barber was ordered when death occurred in his district to make a careful examination of the corpse and report to the authorities any death occurring through epidemic, disease or foul play. Severe penalties were imposed for any neglect of this duty, and a fee of 5 cents was paid for each death registered. Some years ago the system of payment by fees was abolished, and each village barber now draws from the government a fixed salary for his services.—Exchange.

A Monument to "Patience."

When "Patience" was produced at the Standard theater, New York, and afterward at the Grosvenor for seven months, a remarkable run in those days, the opera was taken off in the full tide of its prosperity to produce another opera, "Claude Duval." The artists of the company were rather chagrined at having to rehearse a new opera when "Patience" was so successful, so they built a tomb in the basement of the theater upon which a papier mache statue of Patience was placed, with the inscription "Sacred to the Memory of 'Patience,' Cruelly Murdered by 'Claude Duval.'"—Exchange.
