HIGH SCHOOL SITES FOR VOTERS' CHOICE

A special election of the voters of School Districts No. 4, has been called by the board of directors for October 11, to vote on the location for the site of the proposed county high school.

Following are the offers with the names of the owners, each one being a legal contract to sell for the price named:

Charles Cleveland—Four acres on Main street, town of Gresham, beginning at intersection of Regner's addition, on the west line of James Powell D. L. C., and running east as far as the center line of Hood avenue, 798 feet; thence north 218.34 feet; thence west to west line of James Powell D. L. C., thence south to place of beginning, containing four acres at the price of \$2400 on any terms to suit the purchaser at an annual interest of six per cent.

D. W. Metzger—Commencing at a point where the south line of Metzger avenue and the east line of Roberts avenue south (formerly Damascus road) intersect and running thence east along the south line of Metzger avenue about 294 feet to a point in the south line of Metzger avenue for the place of beginning; thence east along the south line of Metzger avenue four hundred sixteen feet to a point, thence south four hundred twenty-three feet to a point, thence west 370 feet to a point, thence north fifty feet to a point; thence west forty-six feet to a point. 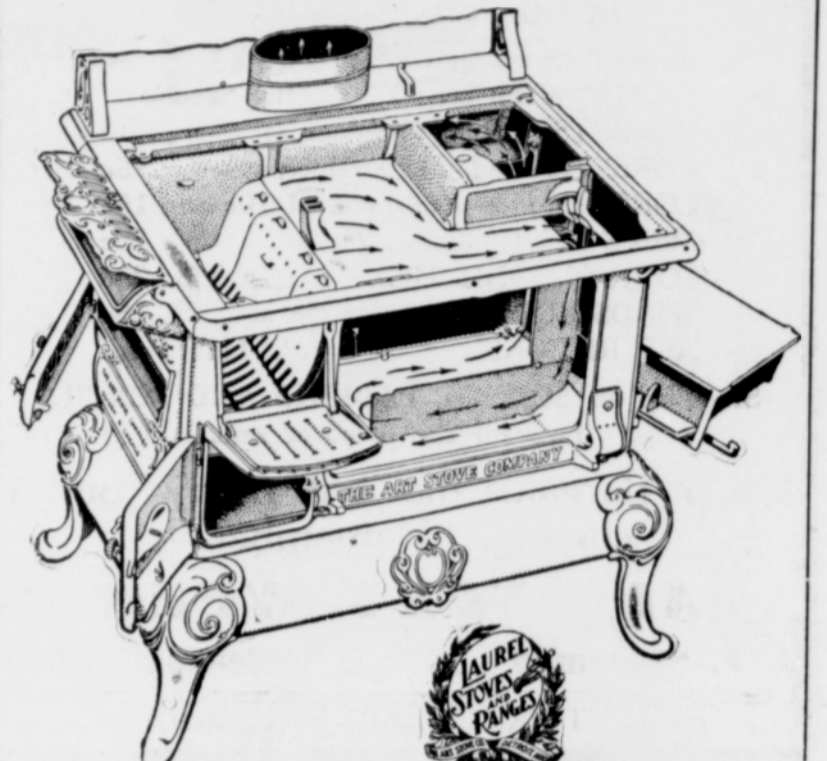
