ORDINANCE NO. 72.

AN ORDINANCE prohibiting Dancing in the Town of Gresham on Sunday.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, within the corporate limits of the town of Gresham, to keep open or conduct any dance, dancing party, or amusement where dancing is permitted on the first day of the week commonly called "Sunday" or the "Lord's Day."

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, within the corporate limits of the town of Gresham to take part in any dance, dancing party or amusement where dancing is permitted on the first day of the week commonly called "Sunday" or the "Lord's Day."

Section 3. That all dances, dancing parties or amusements where dancing is permitted shall stop promptly at 12 o'clock a. m., on the first day of the week commonly called "Sunday" or the "Lord's Day" and all dancing after that time shall be deemed in violation of this ordinance.

Section 4. That any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this act shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not less than \$5 or more than \$50.
