### DEATH AND BURIAL OF JOHN G. THOMAS

John Gaston Thomas, who was brought here from California early last month in a serious condition died at his father's home on Main street Saturday noon. He suffered greatly from cancer of stomach and there was no hope for his recovery from the first but everything possible was done to alleviate his suffering.

Mr. Thomas was a musician of considerable ability and had been playing in Sacramento for the past five years. Previous to that he traveled with a circus, but was a visitor here occasionally and had become known to many of the older residents of Gresham. His age was 37 years. He was unmarried.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the family residence, interment being made in the Gresham District cemetery, Rev. M. T. Wire officiating.
