These errors occur from many causes. Sometimes the "copy" is not legible; again the watchful eye of the "proofreader" fails to catch, what is—after the edition is off the press and it is too late to make corrections—a most glaring error. Then the compositor does not always make the corrections as marked. Rarely are errors the cause of ignorance on the part of editor or proof-reader. Daily papers have such mistakes. We have frequently noted errors in the "head lines" or reputed great dailies. That is only natural. The men and women who work on publications are human and that is "to err." But this is a strange fact. Often the most severe critic of the newspaper man has, makes "horrible" blunders even when making his criticism. That very thing occurred with the Advocate last week. Such a critic called our attention to some errors in the Advocate. But, after doing us the courtesy of pointing out the mistakes which we had already discovered—much to our humiliation—he made the unfortunate blunder of revealing the fact that he is NOT a gentleman.
