Skull and Crossbones Should Go on Alcohol Like Other Poisons—Why Not?

Albany, N. Y., February 19.—The "poison" bill requiring that alcoholic beverages be labeled with skull and crossbones, introduced into the legislature by William E. Knapp, of Chemung, is creating a sensation here as elsewhere. The liquor men tried to treat it as a joke but the people generally consider it seriously. The liquor folks are jumping sideways, not knowing just what to do.

It provides for the placing of the skull and crossbones on every bottle of liquor, the emblem to be in red ink with the statement under it that alcohol is a dangerous poison.

Idaho State Grange for National and State-Wide Prohibition.

Pocatello, Idaho, Jan. 30.—The state grange of Idaho in a largely attended state convention held at Nampa, January 29-21-22, enthusiastically adopted the following resolution:

"That we also heartily endorse the resolution passed by the National grange relating to national prohibition, which reads as follows, to-wit: 'Resolved, That we believe congress should pass a bill to change the constitution of the United States so as to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and submit the same to the several states for ratification.'

"That we also favor such constitutional and statutory amendments as will prohibit such manufacture and sale in the state of Idaho."—The New Republic.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MAKES STATEMENT

County Commissioner Holman is authority for the statement that the increase in taxes this year in Multnomah county is not due to the levies made by the county commissioners.

On the contrary the county taxes for strictly county purposes are more than one mill less than last year. The increase is due to the levies made by other agencies.

Mr. Holman says: To the Taxpayers of Multnomah County:

Of all the different tax-levying bodies that were factors in the levying of the 27-mill tax with which the taxpayers of the city of Portland are at the present time confronted, the board of county commissioners of Multnomah county was the only body to reduce the levy for the present year as compared with last year.

Of the total levy of 27 mills, the board of county commissioners had discretionary powers to the extent of only four mills. The balance, or 23 mills, was levied by other tax-levying agencies, and exceeds the total levy of last year by one mill.

The tax-levying agencies for this community that were factors in the 27-mill levy are the state legislature, the commission of the city of Portland, the port of Portland, the board of directors of school district No. 1, and the board of county commissioners.

The following table shows the items which each controlled and what they did about it, be the reasons therefor what they may:

Table with columns: Tax-levying agency, Mills, Tax levy. Rows include State Legislature, State school, County high school, Total, Port of Portland, City of Portland, School Dist. No. 1, Tot. excl. of county, Multnomah County, County, Road, Library, Total, Grand total.

The total levy this year, exclusive of the levies made by the commissioner, is 1 mill greater than the entire tax last year.

Reduction in total expense of operating Multnomah county this year over last year, 1.15 mills, or \$360,174.05.
