

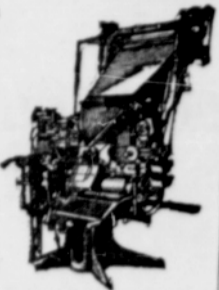

The demand is sure to come in time but perhaps it will be several years off yet. A thousand localities that have been looking for oil wells and found them not may yet have something just as good if fully developed so as to meet the demand when needed.

**Would Colonize Jews.**

Benjamin Brown, president and general manager of the Jewish Agricultural and Colonization association of Gunnison, Utah, recently visited Portland. He had just completed the formation of a colony in San Francisco and proposed after leaving Portland to organize similar colonies at Seattle and in Los Angeles. His purpose in Portland was to organize Jews who would actually go upon farm lands and cultivate them and also to form an auxiliary society to loan Jewish colonists sufficient money to buy land to afford them a start in life. All loans were to bear 4 per cent interest. The plan has worked out very successfully at Gunnison, where 52 families were located on lands, all of whom came from Philadelphia and New York, save four, who came from Oregon. These are now self-supporting and are paying for their land. Mr. Brown is a practical farmer himself.
