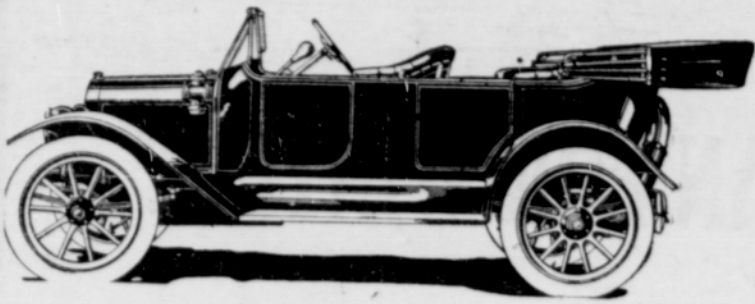

STATE TO SWARM WITH BOB-WHITE

"The bobwhite quail is a splendid combination insect trap, weed-killed and game bird, and as a booster proposition his cheerful whistle is unexcelled," writes Dr. Clifton Fremont Hodge in the January number of the Oregon Sportsman. Dr. Hodge is professor of social biology at the University of Oregon, whose time is occupied wholly in traveling among Oregon communities, speaking and instructing along popular biology lines.

"The annual damage to agriculture by weeds is estimated at nearly \$500,000,000," says Dr. Hodge. "Nearly 53 per cent of the quail's food is weed seeds, and of the 129 seeds it is known to destroy, many are the worst we have—among them beggar's ticks, bindweed, Canada thistle, burdock, curled dock, wild mustard, ragweed, pigweed, lamb's quarters, parsley, sorrel and witch grass. In a snug day's ration, a bobwhite has been found to eat amounts of weed seeds as follows:

"Wild mustard, 2500; burdock, 600; curled dock, 4175; dodder, 1560; evening primrose, 10,000; lamb's quarters, 15,000; peppergrass, 2400; pigweed, 12,000; plain-tain, 12,500; rabbit's foot clover, 30,000; smartweed, 2250; white vernal, 18,750."

That is, the seed of each of these weeds was made the diet of a quail during one day each with the above result.
