Loganberry Growers to Form State Association.

The state-wide organization of loganberry growers that was begun a few weeks ago will be completed at Salem on Saturday, March 14, in the Commercial club rooms. A big attendance is expected from many parts of the state, and business of great importance to the loganberry industry will be considered.

"One of the main purposes of the association is to standardize the product and take steps to keep shipments up to the standard," says Professor C. I. Lewis, horticulturist of the Oregon Agricultural college who is working side-by-side with the growers. "The present condition of market and demand is satisfactory and it is the mission of the association to keep them so. All fresh fruit, the dried products, canned loganberries, all juices, jams and jells, should reach the consumer in good shape.

"We also need to create a bureau of statistics to ascertain the acreage, yield and market conditions, and assist in advertising and distributing the loganberry crop of the state. In short, we want to avoid the mistakes that have hampered the other fruit industries of Oregon."
