## SUN DIAL RANCH HAS CONFLAGRATION

TROUTDALE, March 23.—At an early hour on Saturday morning fire was discovered in one of the houses belonging to the Sun-Dial ranch company, known as the "red house" situated about half way between Fairview and Troutdale. For the past year the house has been occupied by a Japanese family. It is supposed the fire caught from a defective flue, and owing to the strong east wind which was blowing, the house with all of its contents was a total loss, besides about \$750 in currency belonging to one of the Japs which was in the house at the time. The house was one of the oldest buildings in eastern Multnomah, having been built by the late James Stott on his donation land claim.
