ORDINANCE NO.—AN ORDINANCE regulating public Pool and Billiard rooms, prohibiting proprietors, keepers or owners thereof from allowing minors to be or remain therein; prohibiting minors from remaining in or about such rooms; prohibiting maintenance of screens or view obstructions in connection therewith; providing a time for closing such rooms, and providing a penalty. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any proprietor or person in charge of any pool room or billiard room in the town of Gresham to permit, suffer or allow any minor to go into, visit or to remain in a pool or billiard room, or to engage in any game of cards, billiards, pool, dice, or other game of chance in such pool or billiard room or rooms.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any minor between the age of nineteen and twenty-one years to be or remain in or about any pool or billiard room after 10 o'clock p. m.

Section 3. All pool rooms and billiard rooms in the town of Gresham shall close between 12 o'clock midnight and six o'clock a. m. of each day.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful to maintain or keep in any such pool or billiard room any screen or obstruction which prevents a full view from the entrance thereof. It shall also be unlawful to maintain any frosted windows or any opaque curtains or screens for the purpose of obscuring a view of the interior of such room from the street.

Section 5. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance either in person or by his agent or employee, shall upon conviction thereof before the municipal court of Town Recorder be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00 nor less than \$25.00.

Section 6. The council of the Town of Gresham reserves the right to revoke the license of a proprietor or keeper of any pool room or billiard room of the Town of Gresham for any violation of this ordinance, or whenever in the opinion of the council such proprietor of such place is not a fit and proper person or place for such business.
