Now that nominating petitions are all over with for this year there will be an increase in registering. Many refused to register so as to have an excuse for not signing.

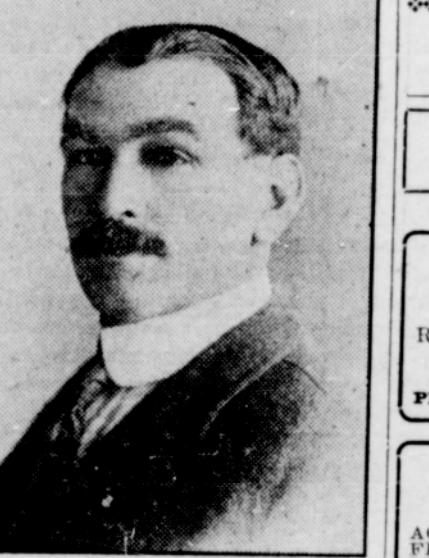
