

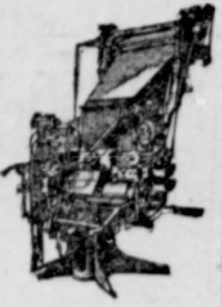

FARM LOANS.

The Outlook has heretofore expressed itself in favor of farm loans as a measure to be adopted by the national congress. The same idea is advanced by R. A. Booth candidate for republican nomination for United States senator. In an address at Eugene last week, he said:

"The United States has borrowed money at 2 and 3 per cent for canal construction. It can afford to borrow money and lend it to producers from the soil at the gross cost.

"If an American farmer has 40 acres of good land with 20 cleared and 20 uncleared, and is hampered by lack of credit and high interest rates, the government should furnish him long-time, low-rate money for the improvements. Production would thus be doubled, taxes would be light and business stimulated. Such a transaction would in every way be sound.

"It would give a new meaning to development in the West and should be furnished for buying land and for land improvement and can be so lent safely. The government would be the guarantor without loss and the homebuilder would be paying 3 to 3 1/2 per cent instead of 6, 8 or 10 per cent with a commission added."

HIS METHODS APPROVED.

The platform issued by Rufus Holman in his announcement that he is a candidate for county commissioner is clean cut and decisive. His record as commissioner has been one of business methods and efficiency as the published records show. His good roads policy is producing results, and his management of the county farm is making it self-sustaining. Other county affairs, such as pertain to the bridges and rock quarries show that he is striving to bring about better results in all departments under control of the board, and that he is receiving the endorsement of everyone who has taken the pains to become informed as to his methods.

EFFICIENT AND POPULAR.

T. J. Kreuder's popular campaign for county commissioner, as one of the two who are to be elected this year, is putting him in the front rank of all the candidates for that office. Two years ago, when but one was to be elected, he was beaten by only a few hundred votes, and at that time he had the solid court house contingent against him. This year there is no such opposition and he still retains all his former strength and popularity. His efficiency is well known and there is no valid reason why he should not be nominated and eventually elected.

It helps a man vastly to recall him from office. Mayors Gill and Fawcett, of Seattle and Tacoma, both "came back" several thousand votes stronger than ever.

A PUBLIC DEFENDER.

Among those who are seeking the nomination for representative on the republican ticket is D. C. Lewis, of Saint Johns. He is the only candidate before the people for the legislative who lives outside of Portland, and the only one out of the entire list not a resident there except our own George W. Stapleton whom we are trying to make a circuit judge.

Mr. Lewis should receive the solid support of all republicans at the primaries, but not alone for the reason that he lives outside of Portland. He has given out a statement of how he would assist in making and enforcing the laws that has not been approached or equaled by any other aspirant.

Following is an epitome of his platform, which for conciseness and lucidity has seldom been equaled and which should be taken as his pledges to the people: He will be here on Tuesday evening, May 5, when an opportunity will be given to hear him further explain his position.

"The state to acquire cheap lands and resell same to deserving settlers on long time and easy terms.

"Less expensive and more efficient court procedure.

"Taxes payable twice yearly with no penalty or interest on deferred half. Taxes to be reduced.

"Real property sold for taxes to revert to the state and the original owners given preference right to redeem.

"Justice to be free as provided by the constitution.

"The will of the people as expressed at the polls to be effectively carried out.

"A public defender.

"The Mann White Slave act be made applicable to local counties.

"The number of state boards and commissions to be reduced.

"Liberal exemption laws.

"Equitable arbitration.

"Wholesome legislation.

ARTHUR LANGGUTH,

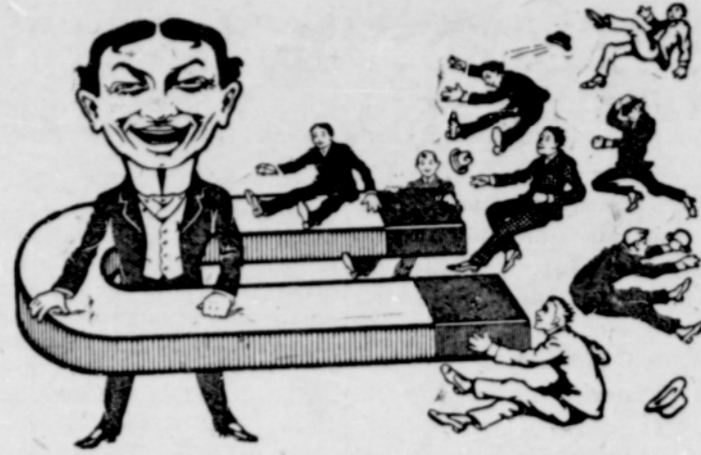
