## IN GRESHAM AND VICINITY

P. F. Uhlig, who recently rented the Gus Richey place in Pleasant Valley, was doing business in Gresham on Wednesday. The Richey place has on it a five-acre orchard, mostly apples, which is one of the finest in the country. Mr. Uhlig is making a specialty of Indian Runner ducks and Barred Rock hens. He has spared no expense in getting the best stock to be obtained in this locality. He has in his flock two cocks which scored among the highest in the last poultry show. Duck eggs and stock from his flock are in great demand, he having sold 5500 eggs for hatching since January 1. His flock consists of 100 birds. The natural method of incubation is employed by Mr. Uhlig, hens being used to hatch the duck eggs.
