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REGISTRATION RESULTS.

Comparisons of the registration figures in Multnomah county for 1912 and this year give the following results:

Table with 3 columns: Party, 1912, 1914. Rows: Republican (9,212 vs 47,707), Democrat (13,894 vs 17,907), Progressive (12,523 vs 3,353).

This ratio will probably hold good throughout the state, but the figures are not available. In an editorial on Sunday the Oregonian says that the great falling off of progressive registration and the increase in democratic registration are indicative of two things.

There was nothing particularly new or attractive in the progressive attitude two years ago except the personality of Roosevelt and his advocacy of the review of judicial decisions by the people.

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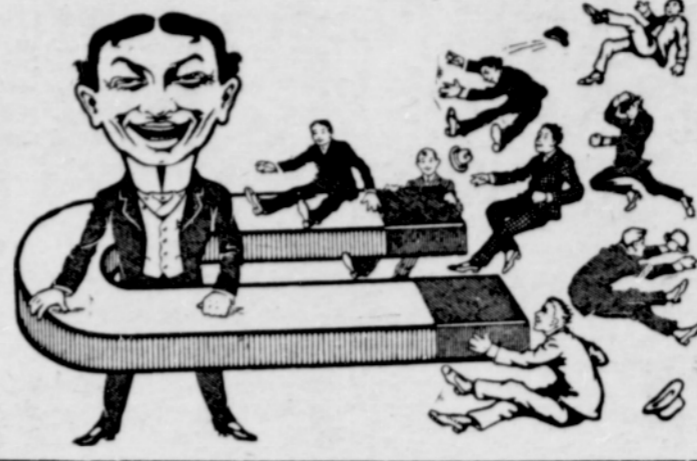
