incorporated, his three elections to fill this position having also been without opposition.

The public activities of Linton, in the incorporation of which Mr. Schaefer took an active part, have been many and important during his incumbency as mayor. Excellent lighting agreements in the nature of franchises with the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company and the Mt. Hood Railway Company have been procured, a franchise entered into by which gas is furnished the town by the Portland Gas & Coke Company, an elaborate first class water system has been installed through which Bull Run water is available for the citizens of that town; and a general and comprehensive sewer system is now in process of installation.

Mr. Schaefer is greatly interested in roads and road-building, and has a thorough practical knowledge thereof, having had immediate supervision of a great deal of work in the widening and rocking of various sections of the St. Helens road.

Mr. Schaefer who has been a resident of Oregon for thirty-six years and of Multnomah county for eleven years; has served with distinction in many public capacities, notably among these, as postmaster at Linton for a period of six years, in which office his record was splendid, practically every patron of the office singing a petition for his retention and the Postmaster's League of Oregon electing him as president; school clerk in the district in which Linton is located to which position he has been elected eight times without opposition, and during his incumbency the affairs of the district have been managed in such a manner that the small one-story hut which served as a schoolhouse has been replaced by a fine building with splendid grounds and equipment; an efficient direction of affairs maintained.

J. W. Brewer, special agent for the State Immigration commission has just returned from a careful survey of the lands included in the area recently eliminated from the forest reserves in central Oregon and his report to State Immigration Agent C. C. Chapman carries with it a note of warning to intending settlers on such lands. Already there is a great number of homeseekers in the eliminated district and it is expected there will be more applicants than there are claims. Of the 236,680 acres actually open for entry, at least 182,000 acres are non-tillable, leaving but 54,000 acres of a character which will support settlers. The elevation of a large part of this section is from 4,200 to 4,500 and there is danger of killing frost at all times in the year. Distance from the railroad varies from 75 to 100 miles, making it extremely difficult to get produce to market. Prospects for grazing are fairly encouraging and Mr. Brewer advises new settlers to turn their attention mainly to stock raising.

The S. P. & S. railroad is considering building a new line from the John Day river to its new terminals at the mouth of the Columbia if better business conditions warrant the expenditure in Oregon.
