FOUR RURAL ROUTES FRUITGROWERS INCORPORATE

Articles of incorporation of the Gresham Fruitgrowers' association have been signed and acknowledged, the incorporators being M. O. Nelson, Charles Cleveland, H. M. Miller, H. E. Davis and F. H. Lehman.

At the meeting last night the subscription blanks were distributed among those of the canvassing committee present and a call was made for tomorrow evening, Wednesday, for the purpose of outlining a plan of proceedure. The committee of 12 is asked to be there.

The cannery question was discussed fully, especially the provisions of the by-laws. It was decided that they would be based on the ideas of other successful canneries at Puvallup, Eugene and Corvall's.

In the matter of payments to the capital stock there will be no call for money before September 1, and then for only what may be needed at that time. The cannery will not be built until next fall and money will not be needed, except for building equipment and supplies. These items will not all come at once and the assessments will be made as the money is required.

The next general meeting will be held at the call of Chairman Davis.
