The Oregon state grange is but five years younger than the national grange itself, and has persevered and demonstrated its usefulness, and increased until the twelve thousand members in Oregon probably represent a larger proportion of the entire population than in any other state in the union. The grange in Oregon has made a place for itself in the social life of nearly every community; its has promoted the things which tend to make a good neighborhood; it has broadened life and awakened aspirations in thousands of homes; it has encouraged and stimulated its members to work for the common good. The grange stands for good citizenship, not in profession merely, but in work actually accomplished.

While not a political order the grange in Oregon has accomplished many things in legislation. It was actually the first, forty years ago, to propose the postal savings bank, rural delivery, and the parcel post. Since then it has helped through its representatives in the national grange to bring all these things about, and many other reforms for He was curly and not very tall which that body has been fighting with such marked success.

All this being admitted, as it is admitted by every well informed person in Oregon, whether a member of the grange or not, it is reasonable to ask what impression the Oregon state grange has made upon the citizens of the state who recognize the value of the work of the subordinate granges. It is an open question.

Although Dr. Withycombe is the nominee of a party that has enrolled three-fourths of the voters of the state there is a chance that he will be beaten at the November election. W. S. U'Ren will run independent and all his votes will come from the republican party. Then there is some danger that the friends of the defeated republican aspirants will desert their banner and vote for either U'Ren or the democratic candidate. It is not going to be a safe bet that Withycombe will poll the full registered vote of the republican, and he may be defeated.

Clackamas and Marion counties voted down the proposed road bond issues. They took the advice of the grange which should be heeded by every county court in the state. Farmers are not generally opposed to taxation for road improvements, but as for bonds—nothing doing.
