POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS.

The difference between what people want and what they are more or less indifferent to is strikingly illustrated by the increase of the parcel post business as compared with that of the postal savings banks.

It has been entirely different with the postal savings banks. There was no very general demand for them, and their development has been slow.

Did you realize that impure water has caused typhoid, malaria, and a multitude of other diseases in Oregon City, Centralia, Washington; and many other towns as well as farms which nature has endowed greatly with every other health benefit.

The physician sees these things because he comes in contact with them. Yet how few people realize how important is the purity of the water they drink.

Look at the history of war in South Africa and you will find that impure water killed more men than did the enemy.

Take, for example, our Spanish American war and see the ravages of fever and pestilence caused by impure water.

Are you a little impressed then that pure water is important to health? If so look to the digging of your wells and be sure that no contamination drains into and infects the water supply.
