MEMORIAL TRIBUTE TO A. G. HORBERG

Mr. A. G. Horberg was born in Smaland, Sweden, August 22, 1870. Came direct to Portland, Oregon, in 1892. He was married to Anna Seller in 1896. This union was blessed with two children, Harold and Ralph. In June of 1902, his wife died and in August Ralph also was called hence. September 5, 1903, Mr. Horberg married Ella C. Benson. This union was blessed with three children. Shortly after his second marriage, the family moved out near Haley, where they have lived ever since. Mr. Horberg was taken sick December 23, 1913. He was taken to the Emanuel hospital in Portland about three months ago, where he has been cared for until his death June 14, 1914, 6 a. m.

Deceased has been a member of the First Swedish Baptist church in Portland until after the Baptist church at Haley was organized when he joined it. He was at the time of his death a deacon of the church, also superintendent of the Sunday school. He has also taken part in the political affairs of the community, serving as justice of peace three terms. He was also a member of the school board for some time serving as clerk. He was a member of the W. O. W. camp 441, Orient. He was a loving husband and a kind father. Besides a wife and four children, he leaves an aged father, two sisters and two brothers to mourn his departure.

The funeral services were held from the Swedish Baptist church of Portland June 16, 2 p. m., Rev. Mr. Linden assisted by Rev. Mr. Johnson of Damascus conducting the services. Miss Linden played the organ. Mr. C. Scott and Miss Johnson, of Powell Valley, sang solos. Interment was at Lone Fir cemetery. There were many beautiful flowers.
