THE PIONEERS.

The pioneer reunion was in evidence in Portland last week; also the reunion of the Indian war veterans. The two are almost synonymous but the organizations are separate. It is to be regretted that many who came here as long ago as 55 years are barred from membership in the pioneers but the rules forbid anyone joining who failed to get into Oregon before it became a state in 1859.

While many of the earliest pioneers have not joined the association, and while the ranks are thinning every year it seems to be the policy of its managers to let it die. It might be perpetuated a longer time by letting in those who came prior to the driving of the last spike on the first overland railroad in 1859. Those who came here before that date are pioneers in every sense and the only difference they found upon their arrival was a few more people. All the privations of the plains were overcome in later years that were met with by those who came earlier. It is unjust to the younger pioneers to keep them out of the association.

Report Shows Financial Condition of Puyallup Association

Once each year, at the close of business on December 31, the officers of the Puyallup and Sumner Fruit Growers' association make their annual report. From the following statement, which is given in detail, it will be seen that the business for last year reached nearly a million dollars. It is expected to pass that figure this year, the growth during the past twelve years since the business was first organized justifying that belief. The report follows:

Financial Statement of Puyallup and Sumner Fruit Growers' Association December 31, 1913. Assets: Cash in banks, \$23,688.96; Cash in office, 221.35; Accounts receivable, 34,732.82; Merchandise, 33,234.14; Fruit in cans and barrels, 99,569.81. Total Liquid Assets: \$191,438.08. Liabilities: Money borrowed from banks, \$55,000.00; Deposits of members, 49,141.00; Accounts payable, 17,077.10; Express certificates, 678.13; Interest accrued and unpaid, 2,481.29. Total Liquid Liabilities: \$124,377.52. Total Capital and Surplus: \$1,345.57.

From the surplus above shown must be deducted the undetermined earnings due H. A. Baker in the barrel department for the years 1912 and 1913, based upon the profits derived on fruit in barrels when all is sold.

The president and secretary of the association are each bonded by a Surety Company in the sum of \$10,000.00, the bonds being held by W. D. Cotter, as Trustee.
