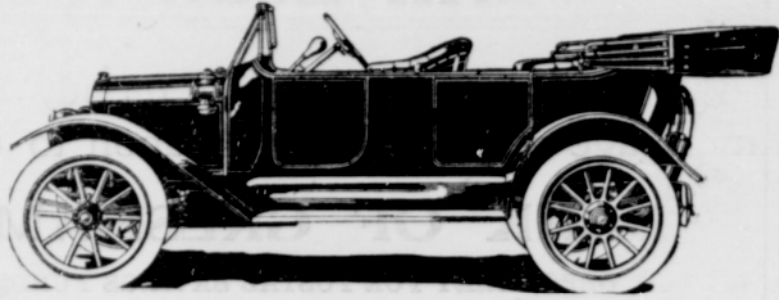

### Convicts Will Fight Run.

The clip-sheet of the Methodist Temperance society, on July 5th, gave the text of a petition signed by a large majority of the prisoners in the Eastern penitentiary of Pennsylvania, pleading with the people of that state to abolish the source of 70 per cent of all crime.

On July 4th another petition was circulated directed to the legislature itself calling attention to the ravages of the licensed saloon upon the morality and peace of the state. The crusade was launched by "The Empire," the prison paper of the Eastern penitentiary. Prison publications in various parts of the country have taken up the fight. "Lend a Hand," edited and printed by inmates of the penitentiary at Salem, Oregon, has long fought the liquor traffic, and is considered one of the most effective temperance and prohibition periodicals in the state. The inmates of the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kansas, are reported to have prepared a petition to congress in favor of national prohibition.

In a letter to the Temperance society of the Methodist church, Mr. Jesse Webb, editor of "Lend a Hand," declares: "I am doing life because of the saloon, and I have a right to my grouch." The petition to the Pennsylvania legislature has 1008 signatures. There are 1478 prisoners in the Eastern penitentiary of that state. The signatures are backed up with stories that would wring the heart of any man.

### Crusades Against Capital Not Popular.

In a community like Oregon, producing so much raw material and having such a wealth of undeveloped resources, the need of capital to employ labor is so great that crusades against investments are not proving popular.

May 27 Portland Central Labor Council resolved to circulate petitions to annul the franchise of the Portland Gas and Coke company, and that powerful labor organization with the backing of front page headlines in the Portland News got busy. Alleged reasons were given for invoking the direct legislation clause of the constitution to attack investments of about three and a half million dollars, but they were not sufficient to interest the public and voters refused to sign.

The whole matter of these franchises has been fought over in the legislature and there was never a

showing made before any committee of the House or Senate that the terms of the franchise had not been kept to the letter.

Franchise-baiting and capital crusading have been a favorite game in Oregon with a certain brand of politicians but the people in general are getting wise and do not fall for the petition circulator that has behind it mere spittlework.

Central Labor Council of Portland soon discovered their movement was not popular in attacking a corporation against which the public had no grievance, and the initiative was among those failing from the start.

If anything results from this failure it will be a reaction against labor organizations that take up public affairs which is really not part of the legitimate business of trades unions.
