LATEST WAR BULLETINS

FRIDAY.

The French have been cut off from Belgians by Germans and German army overruns Belgium, who have abandoned Brussels.

It is officially announced that the Russian army is advancing along the entire Austro-German frontier.

The Germans are proposed to hold Kiau-Chau and a fight to death is expected. They have 4000 men and the Japs are advancing on them with 16,000.

Sugar dropped 50 cents a hundred pounds.

Washington has decided to modify the censorship of wireless messages and will allow the use of a cipher code between embassies and home government.

The situation of Americans abroad has been considerably improved. Foreign countries are assisting in sending them home for the money assured by the United States.

Meats are to go up because American farmers are holding cattle for an expected rise in prices on account of the war.

SATURDAY.

France declares she will drive every German off Belgian soil.

Germans are marching on France prepared for a battle.

Japan has declared war with Germany and will lay siege to Kiau-Chau.

There are 40,000 Americans on the continent who are anxious to get home.

It is predicted that 4000 persons at Kiau-Chau are doomed to death.

British Columbia is considering the confiscation of German owned lands to the British crown.

German forces in Belgium were reported to be marching in force toward the sea coast.

Germans are reported to have backed away from Antwerp which could resist indefinitely.

A great battle between the French and Germans is said to be going on between Namur and Charleroi.

SUNDAY.

Russians are reported victorious in important battle in Eastern Prussia.

The British and French are both taking the defensive and pushing Germany hard.

Servians say they have won a victory over the Austrians.

Industries in this country are threatened by a famine in chemicals. Ostend is frightened over the prospect of being captured.

Russia is well prepared for aggressive measures.

American neutrality is much appreciated abroad.

A great battle is reported in progress along a vast line from Mons to Luxemburg. The battle is likely to last several days. It is between the French and English against the Germans.

United States trade it is said will not suffer from the war.

MONDAY.

A great battle is raging along the Belgium frontier from Mons to Luxemburg and in upper Alsace to Vosges mountains along the river Muerthe, also between the River Lesse and the River Meuse.

Russia, France and England fly Japanese flags over embassies at Tokio.

Determined action was taken by the United States government toward American merchant marine, and the Standard Oil company, the United States Steel Corporation, the United Fruit company and other lines have notified the government that their fleets will be put under the American flag immediately.

The blockade of Tsing-Tau, the fortified seaport of Kiau-Chau, has begun. British, French and Russian

vessels of war are taking part in the movement. Up to the present time only British regiments have received orders to co-operate with the Japanese in the operations against Kiau-Chau on the land side. The French, however, are expecting orders to assist the British. There probably will not be more than two or three regiments from each nation.

Refugees coming from Germany say, according to the London Evening Standard, that reports persist there that Crown Prince Frederick William is dead.
