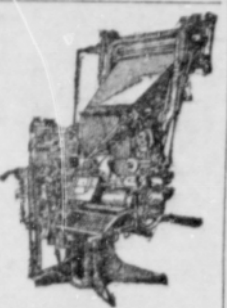

Petitions to the taxpayers of Malheur county are being circulated for purpose of voting a \$30,000 bond issue for a bridge to cross the Snake river.

Every unnecessary initiative law enacted by the people that interferes with industries lessens chances of employment and keeps capital out of Oregon—The Manufacturer.

The Eugene Guard says that the \$1500 tax exemption if it is passed will add 35 to 50 per cent to the tax upon land and tend to keep people away from the farms.

The town of Alvadore on the P. E. & E. Ry. has a new church, a cannery and other buildings under construction and just voted a three mill tax to construct the finest rural schoolhouse in Lane county.

The Portland city council has authorized the purchase of thirty-two acres for \$8000 near Troutdale for a detention home for women, \$7000 in addition will be spent for buildings and improvements.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., of Eugene, has been granted permission by the government to build a logging railroad over a quarter section of Oregon and California Land Grant in Lane county.

Lawyers assert that the proposed eight-hour law, if passed, would be held unconstitutional on the grounds that it conflicts with federal regulations in railroad requirements and the severity of the penalties provided.

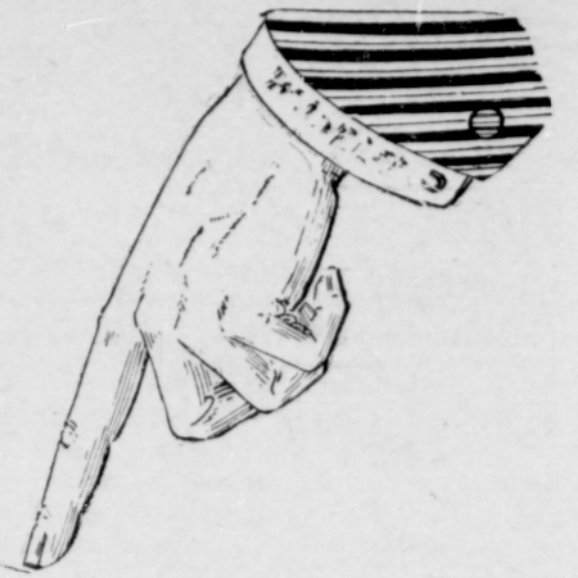
