## FUNERAL OF ELI E. ELLIOTT

The funeral of the late Eli E. Elliott was held this afternoon at the Gresham Baptist church. The sermon was by Rev. O. E. Sandnes. Interment was in the Gresham cemetery.

Mr. Elliott passed away Saturday at the home of his daughter Mrs. Lulu M. Rucker in Portland. He was aged 73 years, 8 months and 5 days. He is survived by five sons, Albion B. and Edward L., of Powell Valley; John C., of Damascus; Francis W., of Alaska, and Earl E. Elliott, of Portland, and two daughters, Mrs. Lulu M. Rucker, of Portland, and Mrs. Florence I. Whilon, of Los Angeles.

Mr. Elliott was a native of Missouri, where he married Miss Ophelia A. Caton and with whom he came west, crossing the plains in 1865. Mr. and Mrs. Elliott came in a train of 100 teams, in which he owned two yoke of oxen and one yoke of cows. The cows gave milk for the journey and supplied the family, consisting of father and mother and eldest son, A. B. Elliott now of Powell Valley. Mr. and Mrs. Elliott settled on a homestead at Damascus where they lived until 1893 when they moved to Powell Valley, and where Mrs. Elliott died in 1910.

Mr. Elliott had been ill for some time and went to Portland about a month ago for medical treatment where he passed away at the home of his daughter.
