

**ORDINANCE NO. 76.**  
 AN ORDINANCE approving and accepting the dedication of Park avenue for street purposes.  
 Be it ordered by the Common Council of the Town of Gresham.  
 Section 1. That the dedication for public street purposes of the following described tract of land hereafter to be known as Park avenue of the Town of Gresham, Oregon, be, and the same hereby is, approved and accepted to wit:  
 A 40 foot strip of land consisting of 20 feet of ground on each side of a center line extending from a point in the West line of South Roberts avenue of the Town of Gresham, Oregon, which point is 234.8 feet northward from the intersection of the South line of the Dan Metzger tract and the said West line of the said Roberts avenue and which center

line extends Westerly 381.5 feet to a point 190 feet North of the South line of said Dan Metzger tract, situated and being in the Town of Gresham, Multnomah county, Oregon.

Mrs. Callie Culter of Vancouver, Washington, visited on Tuesday with W. E. Wood and Grandma Wood.

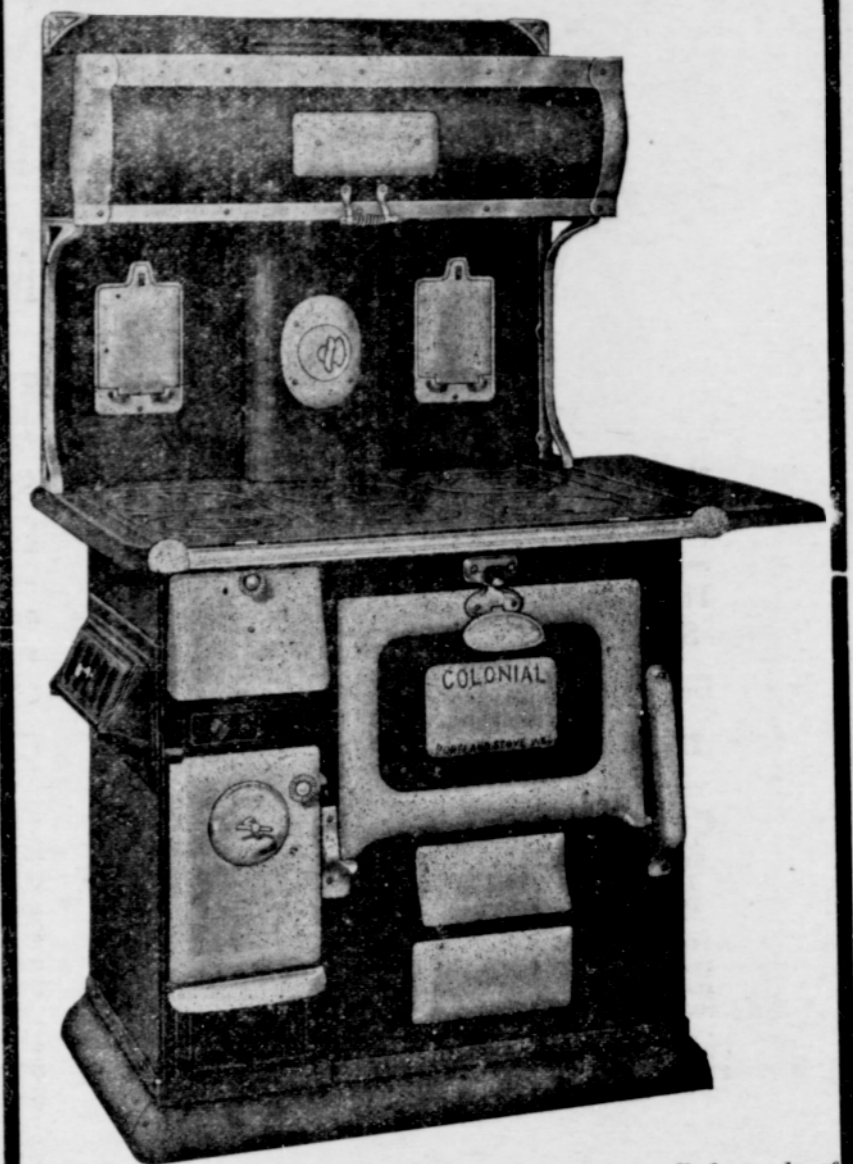

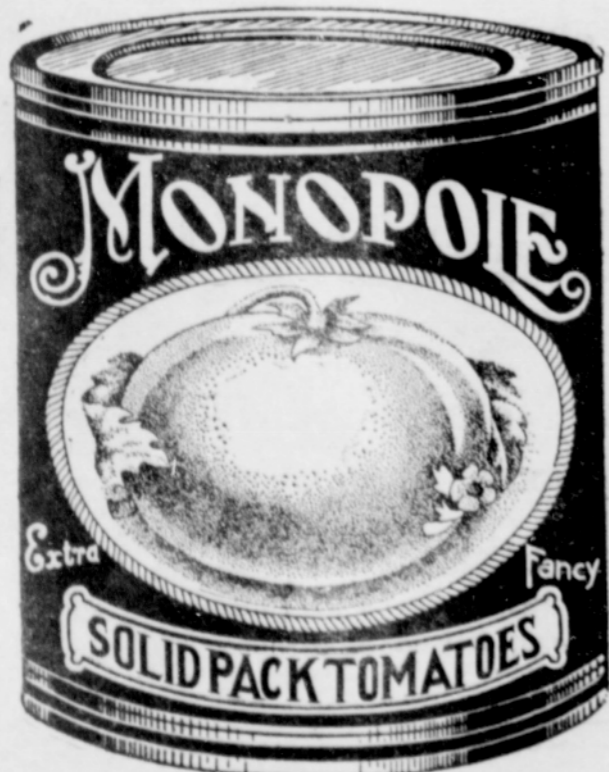
