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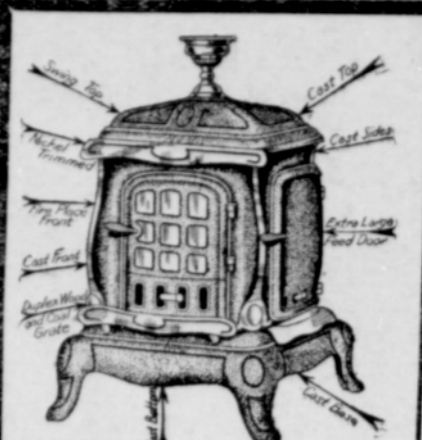

OREGON'S FLAG POLE TALLEST IN THE WORLD

Dr. J. N. Powell writes the Outlook from San Francisco under date of Sunday last that he attended a function of the Oregon club on the Panama fair grounds a few days before for the purpose of dedicating the Oregon flag pole, "the tallest in the world."

In telling of the great Oregon building he says: This building covers an area of 150x250 feet. It is two stories high and a feature are its great columns of solid undressed timber, fir, pine, cedar, spruce and hemlock, each from a different section of Oregon. These are forty feet from base to apex and the largest, a fir, is 22 feet in diameter and would give enough lumber for the construction of an eight room house of average dimensions.

Each trunk, representing a state of the union and bearing its seal, will be dedicated some day during the exposition period and all visitors hailing from the commonwealth the particular trunk stands for are to be invited to participate in the ceremonies, which means forty-two big social functions and wide-spread publicity for the host.
