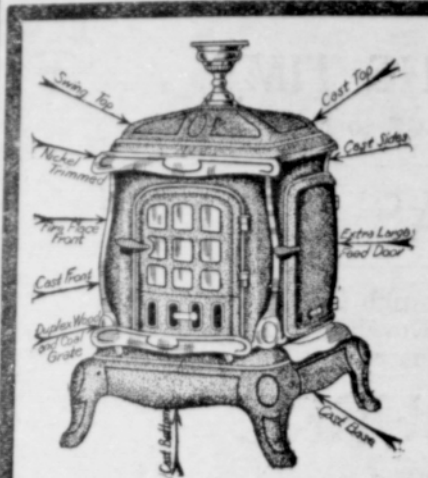
SANDY
