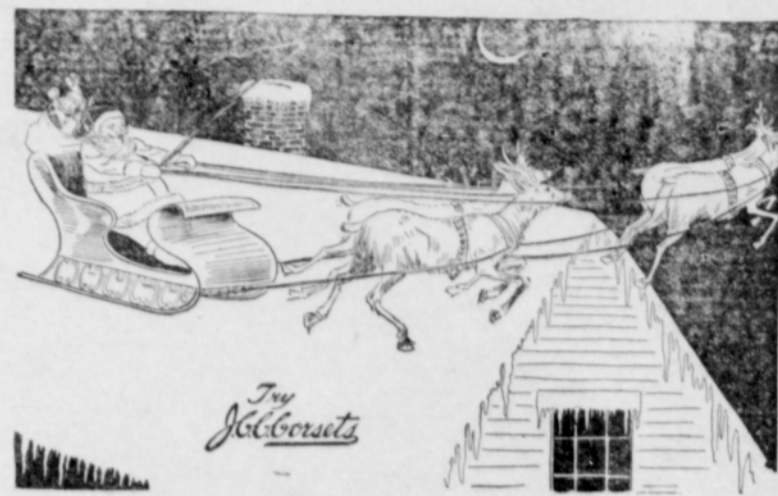

Town Election Notice.

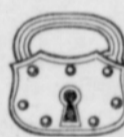
