SERMON TOPICS ARE ENTERTAINING

The revival meetings at the Methodist church now being conducted by Rev. T. L. Jones of Brownsville are opening auspiciously. The services Sunday were of unusual interest. The meeting last night was pre-empted by a spirit of deep solemnity. The topic of Rev. Mr. Jones' sermon last night was, "Have Faith in God." On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons this week at 2:30 o'clock there will be Bible readings. Services every evening except Saturday at 7:30 o'clock.

Rev. Mr. Jones has met several Gresham people whom he knew in the old days at camp meetings here and elsewhere. Though exceeding active and vigorous and alert Rev. Mr. Jones is past three score years and ten and has been in the active work of the ministry for many years. As a pioneer gold miner he was converted and called to preach. His activities in his chosen work have spanned half a century and the results have been great. In company with T. L. Sales, Mr. Jones held the most memorable revival Salem has ever known. This was in the winter of 1885-6. Hundreds were converted, and the echoes of that remarkable manifestation may be heard to this day. Rev. Mr. Sales, who was the brother-in-law of Mrs. J. N. Clananah of this city, died a number of years ago.
