Hard Times Nip Students.

Twenty or more students at the State University at Eugene are likely to have to leave school at the end of the present semester unless they can secure sufficient work during odd hours to maintain themselves until June. "Not even in 1893, the year of the great panic, was it so difficult to get employment for students as now," said Dr. John Straub, who has been on the University faculty 38 years. Six men were unable to return after the Christmas vacation because of lack of funds. One-third of the men at the State University are entirely self-supporting and nearly all the remainder earn money toward their college expenses. Saturday mornings, the Y. M. C. A. employment bureau could frequently use 40 more jobs than it has available.
