### COUNTY REFUSES TO PAVE STREETS

From a report printed in the Oregonian on Wednesday it is learned that Mayor Stapleton has received a communication to the effect that the county can do nothing toward paving the streets within the city limits of Gresham.

It is suggested in the communication that Gresham have its charter amended so that the town can improve the county roads within its limits.

The idea has prevailed that the county would at least assist in the hard surfacing of Main and Powell streets if the bond issue were carried and the work of improving the county roads began. In fact it was stated that Roadmaster Yeon favored the idea, but he is overruled by the county commissioners in the matter.

It seems as if Gresham will have to do the work or let it go by default. In the latter event one can imagine the condition of the streets a year or two hence, as the county will not even apply gravel hereafter.
