ANY OLD BOX MAY BE USED

For all the years that the rural delivery service has been in operation it has been required of patrons that they use only approved boxes for their mail, and no others were allowed.

From the tone of an order recently issued by the Postoffice Department it would seem that an old soap box or coaloil can is all that will be necessary hereafter. The order reads as follows:

"Section 676 of the Postal Laws and Regulations is hereby amended by the addition of the following paragraph:

Any letter box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail matter on any city delivery route, rural delivery route, star route, or other mail route, is hereby designated a letter box for the receipt or delivery of mail matter within the meaning of the act of March 4, 1909, section 198."
