FUNERAL OF MRS. JOHN STILLIONS

Mrs. Elizabeth Dell (Lander) Stillions, wife of John T. Stillions, was buried at Gresham Thursday, Feb. 28. The services were conducted by Rev. A. J. Ware, pastor of the Baptist church at the home of Mrs. Stillions's daughter Mrs. E. A. Easley on Powell street. A choir of mixed voices sang several of the favorite hymns of the deceased. Among them were "Asleep in Jesus," and "The Way of the Cross Leads Home."

Mrs. Stillions was born in Audrain county, Missouri, July 6th, 1852. She was married to John T. Stillions January 1st, 1877. They lived there a few years then moved to northern Arkansas, where they spent most of their married life. She had been sick some time and came to Oregon in October, 1913, thinking possibly the change would improve her health, which it seemed to do for awhile, but owing to age, and previous hard suffering she was unable to recover.

She was the mother of five children, four of whom survive her. They are Mrs. E. A. Easley of Gresham, Oregon, Miss Birdie Stillions of Fresno, California, C. A. Stillions of Eureka Springs, Arkansas, and Mrs. Ruby Poeblescheck of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
