

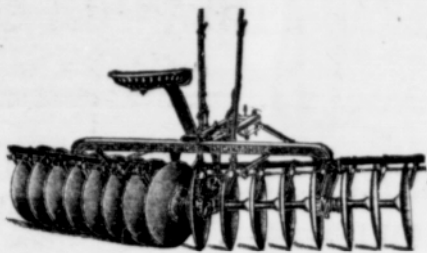

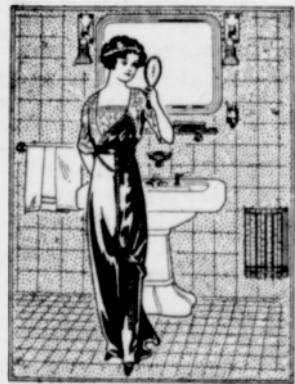

## COLUMBIA HEIGHTS

The Oregon Daily Journal has been giving its readers a great treat for some time by printing the letters every day written by the fearless writer known as our honorable ex-Governor Oswald West. My, how we enjoy his statement pertaining to the legislature and work done in Salem the last few weeks, and we are better off, by reading the same for surely we now are getting our eyes open and can see much better. It is a pity that when a good, honest man is at the wheel, doing his utmost to steer his craft true, clear of all dangerous places that we, the people, don't demand to keep him there. The poor, unfortunate inmates of our state institution lost a friend and protector when Governor West retired from office and they already know it.

I have asked myself the question over and over, why is it that certain class of men having charge of the prisoners can enjoy showing that the prisoners are at their mercy, and must submit to cruelty, well, even to be tortured for any small offense or disobedience to prison rules.

It seems to me that it is punishment enough for a man who has committed a crime to be shut in from the world and deprived of all privileges a man in the free enjoys. I wonder if some of the readers of these humble lines, know what a straight jacket is, if you don't have the least idea what it is and should once happen to see it, if you are a christian you no doubt would think that we were living in the barbarian age and I am nearly tempted to believe that we are going backward instead of onward. I believe that there are but few prisoners by choice, but most of them by circumstances and environment, and I am sure that the prisoners can be managed to better advantage by kindness than by harsh treatment and cruelty combined. It should be the duty of those in charge of such unfortunates to make better men and better women of them after once being punished for their sins.

By studying the life of the prisoners in San Quentin in California, we find that the condition at that place has been much improved of late. But surely the warden and matron that had charge of that institution a few years ago, if there is a punishment hereafter for our sins, they will have to face the hot place down below for their most inhuman treatment to the prisoners. But they were removed after some prisoners had got the state officials to listen to their complaints, and just now as condition became more civilized by the effort of Governor West, it looks as though there will be a great change.
