

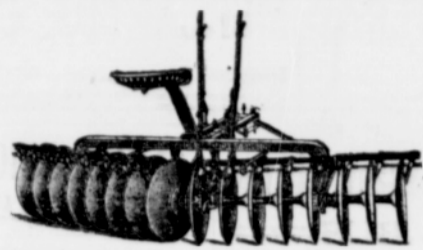

## CORRESPONDENT DESIRES GREATER ACTIVITY

FAIRVIEW, March 1, 1915.—Editor Outlook.—Will you allow me space in your valuable paper to answer a few remarks made by some that our present council after repeated promises before election—after being in office now two months, had done nothing, and are using all their energy to plunge the city into a debt of some ten or fifteen thousand dollars for a water system. If this is the only piece of work that the council does for the entire year it will be a great accomplishment, and the greatest God-send that has been accomplished since the incorporation of our city; and the cost is not such a bugaboo as some like to make it appear. The interest on bonds will be taken care of by the consumer; the enhanced value of our property, the increasing of population, the upbuilding and stimulating of business, will take care of the principal, so why should we worry. I would like to ask you if there is a town, village or city in eastern Multnomah that is in want of a water and sewerage system worse than our Fairview. If so where? During the wet season, especially after the melting of snow, we do not need a pump, no, take your bucket and gather in the overflow. If you please look at some of our property, today a sheet of water. Does this affect our wells? What about the ofal of our city? Why, oh why, is typhoid not in full possession of our city? See the manure piled up in various places; see the mass of rotten vegetation accumulated in some of our principal streets! Those who wish may sneer at Gresham all they please but they will not see such sights there. They all pull together be it for good or bad. They hang on till they get things, or they never would have taken the county fair from us, as they did; and today if Fairview people had stuck together the cannery would have been ours. Yes, Gresham came over and asked us to take it, but, "oh no, I can't sell a site for it at a moderate price. Look at our large, four-room schoolhouse; see what Gresham has in school buildings. Where is the large lumber yard of a few years ago covering the entire space now occupied by the Sun-Dial plant? Also the large wood yard? Fairview was here long before Gresham was even thought of, and we remember when some of the progressive residents of Gresham got out their rakes and how the moss flew, and that is what we want in Fairview right now—some sharp-tooth rakes and in use at that.

The first questions asked by an investor entering your city are about schools, churches, water and sewer systems, and fire protection; and the lack of the last two-named necessities has been the sole cause of our remaining in the old rut that our forefathers cut out. We must advance everything around us. Our advancing generation demands it. Because I have lived the past 40 or 50 years this way without these things, I can live the remaining few days without it and let George do it is simply ridiculous. Come, boost for the water system, quit knocking.
