UNION HIGH SCHOOL NO. 1 TO BE DEDICATED

On Saturday, March 20th, the new union high school building will be dedicated. A program has been arranged, the speakers being County Superintendent A. P. The high school will give a play and each one of the grade schools in the high school district will be represented on the program.

Under the direction of Miss Coulter there will be a domestic science exhibit given for the purpose of stimulating interest in this line of work. The school at present does not teach this course.
