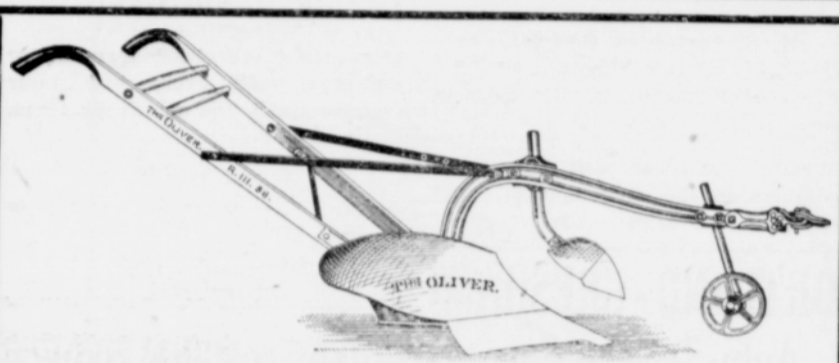

had the distribution system ready? The loss on the tank and well would certainly be well repaid by the service between now and that indefinite future when its usefulness would be outgrown.

Ask yourself Mr. Taxpayer if it isn't worth a dollar a year to each member of your family:

- 1 To have the benefits of Fire Protection?
- 2 To be provided with a safe and pure water supply?
- 3 To be able to have lawns and gardens with a minimum of labor for watering?
- 4 To have your school protected from fire?
- 5 To have ample water for sprinkling and street fountains?
- 6 To know that your property is of more value because it is accessible to water?
- 7 To live in a community that offers this additional inducement as a place of residence?
- 8 To have water available for sewers, in-door closets, bathtubs, etc?
- 9 To live in a community that is on a par with other cities of the state?

And do you know Mr. Taxpayer—

1 That the amount of fire protection to be given by the proposed system, if furnished by a private company, would cost you \$800.00 per year?

2 That no city that ever amounted to anything is ever out of debt—bonded debt?

3 That out of 180 incorporated cities of this state, 143 are provided with systems of waterworks?

4 That more than forty of the cities of the state having populations under 400 are provided with systems of waterworks?

And after satisfying yourself of the truth of the foregoing, whether selfishly for or against the proposition, and after considering that four-fifths of the voters of Fairview have petitioned for an opportunity to vote on the question of a bond issue, can you Mr. Voter and Mr. Councilman see how any fair-minded man on the city council can, with honest purpose, refuse to give you the chance that you petitioned for?

Wouldn't a reconsideration of the action of the recent meeting be in order? There is yet opportunity for justification of former action on the grounds of mis-information and perhaps the council overlooked the fact that the present wording of the city charter is faulty as it pertains to the defining of city boundaries. This fault should be corrected as soon as possible by voting the necessary amendment. E. C. MORRISON.
